Radical Persistence

Late this summer, a black squirrel with a brown tail became an unwanted regular visitor. The goal of the visits was to access our window bird feeder which contained a mixture of seeds, fruit and nuts. In the beginning, to access the feeder it was necessary to start from the deck railing, jump to the nearest windowsill, climb around the division to the next windowsill, around a larger separation to the next windowsill where the feeder was. All of this was not accomplished on his first try, but with persistence and wiliness. We were similarly persistent in trying to keep him from the food we intended for bird visitors, usually to be eventually thwarted by his ability to overcome any challenge.



Now in our culture the word radical tends to have a negative connotation. However, the definition of radical persistence means “to maintain motivation and resilience in the face of challenges”. This squirrel seems to be quite an example of this, as other squirrels have been willing to settle for what they can get without the challenges. In our daily lives, the challenges are many and often relentless. Challenges often entail choices between the faith we profess and not straying too far from what is perhaps easier and/or may make us more comfortable. Comfortably is not how our faith asks us to live. “Consider it a sheer gift, friends, when tests and challenges come at you from all sides. You know that under pressure, your faith-life is forced into the open and shows its true colors. So don’t try to get out of anything prematurely. Let it do its work so you become mature and well-developed, not deficient in any way.” (James 1:2-4 MSG)

At this writing, after many adaptations, we have placed the feeder on the highest part of the window, with all screens removed to further hinder access. So far, the squirrel has not succeeded, but he has also not stopped trying. Our faith in God expects our radical persistence. “Anyone who meets a testing challenge head-on and manages to stick it out is mighty fortunate. For such persons loyally in love with God, the reward is life and more life.” (James 1:12 MSG) submitted by Sally Middleton





Zion Council Meeting

9/9/2025

6 p.m.

Present: Sue Davila, Chris Harrison, Chad Root, Jodee Shaw and Pastor Karen Strietelmeier. **Absent:** Jerri Hisey, Marv Middleton and Sally Middleton

President Chris Harrison called the meeting to order at 6:07 p.m. Pastor Karen provided the devotions using a race car engine as an analogy to our relationship to Jesus Christ. Pastor said just as a race car needs fuel to operate, so must our souls be filled up with the love of Jesus Christ. She explained this is accomplished by people around us filling us with love and compassion and that we must fill up those around us. Pastor pointed out that Jesus commanded us to love not only those we agree with, but also our enemies as well.

Secretary's Report: Chad moved to accept the August report. Sue seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: As the treasurer was absent, there was no September report.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Karen noted she had a busy September. She participated in the Back to School event at Bristol Elementary School and worked the Zion booth at both the Bristol Auto Show and the Corndog Festival at Congdon Park on two consecutive Saturdays. She also attended the Compassion Cafe, met with several folks interested in joining the church and learned that three current Zion members would like to be trained as home and hospital visitors. Pastor reported that one of the area connections she made at the Bristol Auto Show was with Benchmark Family Services, which finds and trains families to serve as foster parents throughout Indiana. The organization wants to expand into Elkhart County and is in need of a place to provide this training, which would occur on several Saturdays throughout the year. Pastor said Benchmark is also in need of suitcases and blankets, as well as children's clothing, since the children typically bring nothing with them when they are removed from their homes by Social Services. The council discussed asking the congregation to donate used suitcases and new blankets to the cause. Pastor said Benchmark could also partner with Zion's Clothes Closet regarding the need for children's items. Jodee moved to allow Benchmark to use the church for its training. Sue seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Ministry Areas:

Fellowship: The World Hunger Auction was scheduled for November 9.

Personnel: Chad reported that Zion's new secretary, Lesley, is doing a wonderful job.

Social Ministry: Chris said Sally Middleton asked her to announce Zion's October mission will be Sleep In Heavenly Peace, a local organization that provides beds for children who don't have them. The organization's motto is "No Child Sleeps on the Floor in Elkhart County."

Nominating: Two new members will be needed for the Church Council in 2026. Sue said Juan Davila and Lana Stutsman are working on obtaining members to run for these positions.

Christian Education: Sue said children's Sunday School started back up September 7.

Technology: Chad said he noticed a glitch in the projector at Sunday's service. He said he will work on it.

The **Long Range, Worship & Music, Property, Finance and Audit, Cemetery, Stewardship, Evangelism and Pastoral Advisory** committees had nothing to report.

Old Business:

Pavilion: President Chris reported ground for the pavilion was cleared and leveled and that the lumber had been delivered. She noted the Pavilion Committee purchased a picnic table to display to the congregation and that she is hopeful Zion members will purchase additional tables.

Bell Tower Dedication: Chris said the tower will be dedicated September 21. She reported invitations were mailed to past Zion members. Chad said he will look into obtaining some media coverage of the historical event. The bell was originally dedicated at the old church in 1955. Pastor Karen said she is working on the dedication service, which will be held at the tower after Zion's regular Sunday service inside the church. A carry-in dinner will be held inside the church following the bell dedication.

Piano: Chad mentioned an email sent to council members by Vice President Marv Middleton regarding a suggestion by the piano tuner that the baby grand piano be kept at a temperature between 68 and 72 degrees. Marv wrote that he normally keeps the sanctuary at this temperature only during Sunday or special services. He said the setback for the other six days of the week is 59 or 80, depending on winter or summer. Marv wrote that he did some research into the subject and found another opinion that the ideal temperature is 60 to 80 degrees. Marv said he will have more information on the subject at the October council meeting. Marv also noted a humidifier for the baby grand will cost between \$700 and \$800. Jodee reminded the council that the Zion family that purchased the piano for the congregation agreed to cover all of the expenses for the piano.

New Business:

The HUB: Chris said Zion received an email from the HUB reporting it has ended its contract with the USDA, which provides about 30 percent of the food pantry's dry food received monthly and around 70 percent of its meat. The HUB based its decision on several requirements added by the USDA. These requirements include opening up the Bristol pantry to any resident of Indiana, regardless of which county they reside, and closing the pantry to Michigan residents, such as those in Union, who have been served by the Bristol food pantry for many years. Another condition is that the pantry would not be allowed to retain or share for grant money any data on its families. The HUB currently relies heavily on grant money to operate the food pantry. The HUB is asking churches that volunteer at the HUB to collect food for the pantry in the month leading up to their volunteering to offset the impact of the reductions in USDA food provisions. Chris said she would like the congregation to discuss other ways it can help the HUB to offset the losses.

Security at the old church: Jodee brought up a conversation she and Pastor Karen had with a neighbor of Zion at the Bristol Auto Show. The neighbor reported that one late night in July she witnessed several cars pull into the old Zion parking lot and approximately a dozen male teens enter the church. The neighbor said she could see their flashlights as they walked around all three floors of the church. The neighbor called the police, who did respond to the trespassing call. The neighbor said she viewed the police talking to the boys, who then returned to their cars and drove off. Jodee pointed out that if one of the trespassers was injured, Zion could be held legally responsible for their injuries since the church is not locked. Pastor Karen and Chad also expressed concern. Chad asked why the doors are not locked. Chris said they are left open so people can drop off items for the Clothes Closet. Jodee said Zion needs to find an alternative way to have the donations dropped off, such as providing drop-offs on Thursdays, when the volunteers are working in the building, and/or installing a large donation box, similar to the ones used by Goodwill, near the front door. Chad said he will look into the cost of obtaining a large donation box.

Jodee moved to adjourn the meeting. Chad seconded. The motion passed unanimously.


